Jim actually graduated from both CMR and RMC, the former in 1994 (UTPM) with a BA (Hon) Military & Strategic Studies, and the latter in 2005 with an MA War Studies (Intelligence). He joined the Canadian Forces in 1985 in the armour occupation, and served as a crewman in Lord Strathcona's Horse from 1987-1990, which included a tour in Cyprus as a rifleman patrolling the Green Line in Nicosia, before being selected for the UTPNCM program.

While at CMR he served as Cadet Squadron Leader of Escadron Saint-Laurent (8 Sqn) during his IV year there. On graduation, he was commissioned as a 2Lt in the Intelligence occupation, and served in Ottawa and Montreal in various tactical and strategic level intelligence positions between 1994-97, completing a tour in Sarajevo with the IFOR in 1996 while on the strength of SQFT.

In 1997, he was posted to Ottawa, and served in the National Defence Intelligence Centre between 1997-2000, and as Staff Officer to the Director General Intelligence between 2000-2001. He was promoted to Major in 2001, and posted to Kingston, where he worked for two years at the Directorate of Army Training before proceeding on sponsored PG study at RMC.

On graduation in 2005, he was posted back to Ottawa, where he currently serves in the Chief Defence Intelligence organization. His job here involves intelligence support to the senior leadership and Strategic Joint Staff.

Jim is married, to Lin Hum, and they have two children; Amanda, who is 10, and Alexander, who is 5.

Major Mark Godefroy was born and raised in Montreal, Canada, where he completed secondary school prior to joining the Canadian Armed Forces in 1985. Following basic and specialist officer training he was commissioned as a second-lieutenant in the Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery and posted to 119 Air Defence Battery at Canadian Forces Base Chatham, New Brunswick, where he served his first tour of duty as a Blowpipe Surface-to-Air Missile (SAM) troop commander. From 1990-1998 he served in a variety of other positions on regimental duty in both Canada and Germany, and as an Air Defence Instructor-in-Gunnery at the Canadian Air Defence Artillery School in Chatham, New Brunswick. Major Godefroy attended a number of courses during the same period, amongst them the Canadian Forces Staff School course, the Artillery Staff Duties Course, the Air Defence Command and Control Course, the US Air Defense Command and Control Course at Fort Bliss, Texas, and the NATO Air Defence Studies Course at Florennes, Belgium. He is also a graduate of the Canadian Land Force Command and Staff College in Kingston, Ontario.

In 1998, Major Godefroy was posted to the Royal Military College (RMC) of Canada where he completed a Bachelor of Military Arts and Science degree program with First Class Honours standing. It was during this period in his career that he voluntarily transferred to the Canadian Military Intelligence Branch. Following graduation from RMC and completion of the Basic Intelligence Officer course in 2000, he assumed the role of G2 Plans at the Canadian Army's Land Force Western Area Headquarters in Edmonton, Alberta. In 2002, he served as the G2 of 1st Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group Headquarters in Edmonton, Alberta, and was responsible for providing Intelligence support to the Canadian Forces' Land Component conducting security operations during the G8 Summit in Kananaskis, Alberta. Following the G8 Summit, he was posted to the 1st Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry Battle Group and deployed with the unit to Zgon, Bosnia-Herzegovina as the S2 in 2002-2003. He then returned to Canada in 2003 to assume the position of G2 at Land Force Western Area Headquarters. In February 2006, Major Godefroy deployed to Kandahar, Afghanistan, where he served for six months as the commanding officer of the Canadian All-Source Intelligence Centre in support of Canada's military contribution to Operation Enduring Freedom. Maj Godefroy is currently serving as both the G2 of Land Force Western Area Headquarters and the J2 of the newly created Joint Task Force-West Headquarters, an element of Canada Command.

Mark Godefroy is married to Cheryl (nee Lawrence) and currently resides in the Edmonton area with their son Jack. An avid hunter, fisherman, and outdoorsman, his leisure time is spent in the great outdoors with family and friends in pursuit of his many hobbies and interests.

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G1397 Andrew Godefroy, CD, M.A., Ph.D. is an independent strategic analyst and historian who specializes in leadership, innovation, technology, and operational design and analysis. He is well known for his work on science, technology, and society, Canadian aerospace and missile defence issues, as well as the history and evolution of Canada's army.

Born in Montreal, Quebec, Andrew Godefroy is a graduate of Loyola College, Concordia University and the Royal Military College of Canada (where he received his M.A. and Ph.D.). His graduate work examined U.S.-Canada cooperation in space and missile defence programs, while his post-graduate dissertation work examined the relationship between research, defence, and government, using the genesis and evolution of Canada's rocket and space program as his case study. He was the first person to declassify and examine several of the earliest records on Canadian post-war rocketry, upper atmospheric, and space research during the completion of his doctorate. His subsequent publication of this research initiated a fundamental reassessment of Canada's role in outer space since the advent of the space age.

Andrew was a research fellow at the Centre for Space Research at the Royal Military College of Canada, as well as a strategic analyst, policy officer, and technology advisor on defence space programs, Canada-US defence space cooperation, and civil-military space cooperation for the Directorate of Space Development, Department of National Defence, between 1998 and 2004.

Dr. Godefroy has written books, several book chapters, scholarly articles, and dedicated studies on Canada's rocketry and space policy, technologies, and history for organizations including the Department of National Defence, Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade, Canadian Forces College Toronto, the Royal Military College of Canada, and the Canadian Space Agency. In 2006 he was contracted by the Canadian Space Agency as its first official historian.

He has also served as a member of the Canadian Army Primary Reserve since 1990 in regimental, operational, staff, and headquarters duties. He has held a commission since 1993 and currently holds the rank of Major. He has been involved in joint operations as well as conceptual and doctrinal design work since 2000. In 2004 he became editor of The Canadian Army Journal and the Director of the Fort Frotenac Army Library. In 2006 he was made a member of the adjunct faculty at the Royal Military College of Canada. He has written books, book chapters, and several scholarly articles on subjects related to the Canadian Army, and has made regular appearances on television and other media speaking on these subjects as well.

Dr. Godefroy is a recipient of the Canadian Forces Decoration, Canadian Battlefields Foundation Bursary, as well as several Security and Defence Forum scholarships.
